Why survey **SeX** NOW?

Infections have been rising. At least 158 gay men in BC got HIV in 2002 – a 52% increase since 2000.

Why?

It's a question of prevention...
What's happening with
sexual safety in BC?





When infections rise so does your risk.

Consider this: the more guys who have HIV, the greater your chance of getting it through unprotected anal sex.

That's why fucking without condoms can be risky if you don't know your partner's status.

Do vou?



Sex Now brought together a large sample of men interested in other men...

Sex NOW found more similarities among us than

differences.

No matter where we live, our identities, education or background...

we're all up to the same kinds of stuff.

Guys who had more partners often had riskier sex and used more drugs.

Why is that happening?

sex Now pictured gay sex as we rarely see it.

Here's how we shaped up in the last year:

Percent who enjoyed fucking: 84%

Percent who fucked with more than one guy: 57%

Percent who fucked with a guy of **unknown HIV status** without

condoms: 27%

Percent who fucked with more than one guy of unknown HIV status without

condoms: 15%

Where does that put you?



SEX NOW found barebacking less common than it may seem.

But...

The number of guys who fucked without condoms increased by **25%** since 2000, and At least 1 in 4 guys fucked raw with unknown status partners last year.

That's risky.



sex NOW showed sexual safety is more than just condoms...

- ∞ 9 out of 10 guys had tested for HIV,
- 2 out of 5 in the last six months,
- 1 out of 5 in the last year.

Guys with more partners, tested more frequently.

How often are you testing?

EXUS

2 out of 3 guys in relationships were fucking raw,

but...

- 9 out of 10 knew their partner's HIV status, and
- 1 out of 4 had a partner with a different status than their own.
- 1 in 2 guys had agreements not to have sex with anyone else, and
- 2 out of 5 made a specific agreement about sex with others.
- 1 in 6 hadn't talked about it.

settings were

hot.

Popularity	Active last year	Percent of men
1. Baths	623	35%
2. Internet	572	32%
3. Park	503	28%
4. Phone line	301	17%
5. Sex party	265	15%

Guys who had riskier sex were more likely to be there: the more often, the riskier the sex.



What does that tell you?



SEX NOW showed that...

we're connected:

- 2 out of 3 guys spent half or more of their free time with other gay men.
- 9 out of 10 read the gay press, visited gay bars and social events.

Most guys are playing safe but

 for 1 in 6: the more connected, the riskier the sex.

What's up with THAT?

Sex NOW made it clear we

all have prevention needs...

- 1 out of 3 guys didn't realize you can have syphilis without knowing it.
- ∞ 1 out of 3 had trouble talking about safe sex.
- ∞ 1 out of 5 didn't have condoms when needed.
- 1 out of 6 didn't have the confidence to say "no" to unsafe sex.

Hardly anyone knew infections were rising.

What about you?





SEX NOW uncovered a great

MISPERCEPTION.

- 7 out of 10 guys agreed: "a man with HIV should tell his status before sex".
- ∞ 6 out of 10 guys visiting the baths thought so too.

Disclosure is a lot to expect in some scenes and not always clear.

Are you leaving safety to the other guy?

sex Now showed

we have a culture

in common...

Gay health depends on all of us.

- Keep testing.
- Take care of each other.
- Talk over HIV status supportively.
- Make agreements you can keep.
- Be consistent with safety.
- ∞ Stay informed.

The POWER is

yours.
